Egg Harbor Hunters Plan Extensive Ban On That Sport.

Egg Harbor.—A meeting of land owners of this town was recently held to plan on a united effort to prohibit hunting in this township. All present were of the opinion that such a move would be prudent to curb the carelessness of hunters and to protect the lives of land owners, farmers and stock. A committee was appointed to have the proper notices published in the county papers and same will be found in another column of The Democrat. Another meeting will be held on Saturday, Nov. 2nd, at the Egg Harbor town hall and at Volkman's hall at Carlsville to which all land owners in the town of Egg Harbor are urged to attend. Jos. Our telephone line has been in bad shape since the wind storm of last week. The wires are crossed with the Sevastopol line. The J. S. Crouse loaded wood on Wednesday and sailed for Sheboygan. John Carmody lays claim to a large crop of potatoes, having already dug over 700 bushels and still more to take out. Saloon Property Changes Hands. Jule Malcorps of Duvall, Kewaunee county, has sold his hotel and saloon property to Dan Duschelet of Brussels. Consideration \$4,500. Chris. Hanson has sold his saloon in Jacksonport to John Junlon; and Mr. Hanson has purchased a house and two lots owned by Mrs. Junlon at Carney, Mich. The saloon property was valued at \$2,400 and the house and lots at \$2,000. Both deals were handled by Mike Simon.

LARGE CROWD HEARS FREAR Successful Political Meeting Held At Baileys Harbor.

Baileys Harbor.—Over 100 people gathered at the town hall on Friday evening to hear Secretary of State J. A. Frear speak on "State Expenses." The address was a most interesting one and the speaker made his arguments plain and to the point. He explained how the county received back practically every dollar it paid to the state, it being returned for the county highways, schools, etc. He told how the income tax receipts were going to reach \$3,300,000 and that it was coming from the wealthy class, \$1,000,000 of it being paid from the city of Milwaukee alone. In Door county the speaker stated that only 143 people of the 20,000 inhabitants paid an income tax, ten of these being farmers. It was shown that the present Republican administration was conducting the affairs of the state to the best interest of the people.

Assemblyman L. L. Johnson also made a brief address, outlining his position in a clear and forceable manner. Mr. Johnson has a host of friends in this town who are desirous of seeing him re-elected to the assembly.

A large number of people from this vicinity were attracted to Maplewood on Friday night to attend the Casper show, held at Neuhall's hall.

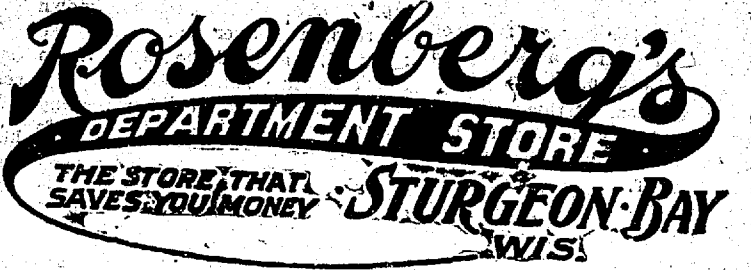

General Election Notice.

State of Wisconsin, Department of State—sa.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at a general election to be held in the several towns, wards, villages and election districts of the state of Wisconsin, on the first Tuesday succeeding the first Monday of November, A. D. 1912, being the fifth day of said month, the following officers are to be elected.

Thirteen electors of President and Vice President of the United States. A Governor, in place of Francis E. McGovern, whose term of office will expire on the first Monday of January, A. D. 1913.

A Lieutenant Governor, in place of Thomas Morris, whose term of office will expire on the first Monday of January, 1913.

A Secretary of State, in place of James A. Frear, whose term of office will expire on the first Monday of January, 1913.

A State Treasurer, in place of Andrew H. Darr, whose term of office will expire on the first Monday of January, 1913.

An Attorney General, in place of L. H. Bancroft, whose term of office will expire on the first Monday of January, 1913.

A Representative in Congress for the Ninth Congressional District, comprised of the counties of Langlade, Forest, Brown, Marinette, Oconto, Outagamie, Florence, Kewaunee, and Door.

A Member of the Assembly for the Assembly District, comprised of the county of Door.

In accordance with Section 1 of Article IV of the constitution of the state of Wisconsin, and Chapter 655 of the Laws of 1911, the following Joint Resolutions adopted by the legislature of the state of Wisconsin at the regular sessions of 1909 and 1911 are made a part of the foregoing notice and are to be voted upon at said election, to-wit:

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 24. To amend section 10, article VII of the constitution, relating to the salary of judges.

Resolved by the Senate, the Assembly concurring, That the following section of the constitution of the state of Wisconsin be amended to read: Section 10. Each of the judges of the supreme and circuit courts shall receive the salary, payable at such time as the legislature shall fix, of not less than one thousand five hundred dollars annually; they shall receive no other salary while in the service of the state; their salary shall hold no office of public trust, except a judicial office, during the term for which they are respectively elected; and no person shall be eligible to the office of judge, or hold any other office, at the time of his election, be a citizen of the United States, and have attained the age of twenty-five years, and be a qualified elector at the time of his election, to which he may be chosen.

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 42. To amend section 3 of article XI of the constitution, relating to municipal corporations and their indebtedness.

Resolved by the Senate, the Assembly concurring, That section 3 of article XI of the constitution of the state of Wisconsin be amended to read: Section 3. It shall be the duty of the legislature, and they are hereby empowered to provide for the organization of, and to restrict their power of taxation, assessment, borrowing money, contracting debts, and issuing bonds, in such manner as may be deemed expedient by the legislature, and in such manner as to not incur any indebtedness in any manner or for any purpose to any amount, including existing indebtedness, in the aggregate, exceeding five per centum of the value of the taxable property therein, to be ascertained by the last assessment for state and county taxes previously made, and no municipal corporation shall incur any indebtedness of any kind, except as provided for in this section, until it has first secured the approval of a direct annual tax sufficient to pay the interest on such debt as it falls

due, and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof within twenty years from the time of contracting the same; except that when such indebtedness is incurred in the acquisition of lands by cities or by villages having a population of 150,000 or over, for public, municipal purposes, or for the permanent improvement thereof, the city or county incurs the same shall before or at the time of so doing, provide for the collection of a direct annual tax sufficient to pay the interest on such debt as it falls due, and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof within a period not exceeding fifty years from the time of contracting the same;" now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate, the Assembly concurring, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Wisconsin be, and the same is hereby agreed to by this Legislature.

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48. To amend article XI of the constitution by adding thereto a new section to be known as section 3a, relating to the acquisition of lands by the state or any cities or by villages for certain public purposes.

Whereas, At the biennial session of the legislature for the year 1909, an amendment to the constitution was proposed, and the same was approved by the members elected to the two houses, which proposed amendment is as follows:

Resolved by the Senate, the Assembly concurring, That article XI of the Constitution be amended by adding a new section thereto, to be known as section 3a, to read:

Section 3a. The State or any of its cities may acquire by gift, purchase, or condemnation lands for establishing, enlarging, extending, extending, and maintaining, streets, squares, parkways, boulevards, parks, playgrounds, sites for public buildings, and reservations in and about and along and leading to any or all of the same; and after the establishment layout, and completion of such improvements, may convey any such real estate thus acquired and necessary for such improvements, with reservations concerning the future use and occupation of the same, so as to protect and preserve the view, appearance, light, air, and usefulness of such public works; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate, the Assembly concurring, That the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Wisconsin be, and the same is hereby, agreed to by this Legislature.

JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 103. S. To amend section 12 of the statutes, extending the right of suffrage to women.

An act to amend section 12 of the statutes, extending the right of suffrage to women.

The people of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 12 of the statutes is amended to read: Section 12. Every person male or female of the age of twenty-one years or upwards, belonging to either of the following classes, who shall have resided in the state for one year next preceding any election, and in the election district where he or she is to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector at such elections:

1. Citizens of the United States.

2. Persons of foreign birth who, prior to the first day of December, A. D. 1907, shall have declared their intention to become citizens conformably to the laws of the United States on the subject of naturalization; provided that the rights hereby granted to such persons shall cease on the first day of December, A. D. 1912.

3. Persons of Indian blood who have once been declared by law of congress to be citizens of the United States any subsequent law of congress to the contrary notwithstanding.

4. Civilized persons of Indian descent not members of any tribe.

5. Any civilized person, being a descendant of the Upper and Lower Sioux tribes, or any other Indian tribe residing within this state, and not upon any Indian reservation, who shall make and subscribe to an oath before the clerk of the circuit court or his deputy or the county where such person resides, that he or she is not a member of any Indian tribe, and that he or she has never been declared by congress to be a citizen of the United States for aid and assistance from any appropriation made by congress for the benefit of Indians, and that he or she otherwise qualifies for citizenship, and all rights to claim or receive such aid, shall be entitled, on such oath being filed and recorded, to vote at all elections held in this state, if he or she is otherwise qualified to be a citizen, on being corroborated as to the residence and tribal relations of such person by the affidavit of a qualified elector shall be filed in the office of the clerk before whom it was taken and recorded by him; in a book to be provided for that purpose, upon such person paying to said clerk the sum of one dollar.

6. No person under guardianship, non

compos mentis or insane shall be qualified to vote in any election, nor shall any person convicted of treason or felony be qualified to vote at any election unless restored to civil rights.

Section 2. The question whether the foregoing provisions of this act shall take effect and be in force, shall be submitted to a vote of the people of this state, in the manner provided by law for the submission of an amendment to the constitution, at the next general election to be held in November, 1912. If approved by a majority of all the votes cast on that subject at such election, it shall take effect and be in force from and after such approval by the people; otherwise it shall not take effect or be in force. Upon the ballot shall be printed "Shall Chapter (insert or the ballot the number of chapter) of the laws of the state entitled 'An act extending the right of suffrage to women' be adopted."

Section 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

A Register of Deeds to succeed Otto Nelson, whose term of office will expire on the first Monday of January, 1913.

A Clerk of Circuit Court to succeed Allen Higgins, whose term of office will expire on the first Monday of January, 1913.

A County Treasurer to succeed Charles Pflinske, whose term of office will expire on the first Monday of January, 1913.

A County Surveyor to succeed A. C. Greaves, whose term of office will expire on the first Monday of January, 1913.
