KONOP CARRIES DISTRICT.

Latest figures obtainable on the congressional situation in this district give Congressman Konop a total of 15,504 and Congressman Morse a total of 15,204, which makes the majority of the Democratic candidate exactly 300.

Tuesday's election, one of the greatest ever held in the history of the county, kept the voters in suspense until yesterday in regard to the election of governor of Wisconsin, when the late figures showed a victory for McGovern over Karel by about 5,000.

The election of Wilson for president had been conceded by nearly every one before election day, but he swept the country by a greater majority than his most ardent supporters had even hoped for. Roosevelt was second in the race, not as strong, however, as had been predicted, and Taft made a poor showing as third.

The election in Wisconsin, however, had in store the greatest surprises. As returns from Milwaukee county came in, giving Karel a big majority, the Democrats felt jubilant and it was estimated that the Democratic nominee would carry the state by 50,000 or more. As the vote from the rural districts came in it kept cutting down Karel's lead and twenty-four hours after the polls had closed the Democrats conceded Karel's defeat and the election of McGovern and the entire Republican state ticket by about 5,000.

Door county also had its surprises. With the Democratic leaders assisted by a number of Republicans who had a friendly feeling for Karel, making a most vigorous personal campaign throughout the county, McGovern carried the county by 197.

Congressman Konop did not do as well as Karel, he losing the county by 260, after making several speeches in the county and a personal canvas, while his opponent, Morse, only spent one day in the county.

The defeat of the independent candidates indicates that the voters desire that candidates stand with their party and run on their party ticket. The defeat of H. A. Wagenner, independent candidate for sheriff, was a surprise to his many friends and supporters. "Hub" had been considered an exceptionally strong candidate, but he went down to defeat before his Republican opponent, Ben Miller, who had a majority of 250.

Assemblyman L. L. Johnson's election was not in doubt at any time; however, his majority of 775 over his nearest independent opponent, Jos. C. Dana, was larger than his friends had expected. Mr. Johnson received a most gratifying endorsement from the voters, carrying the city of Sturgeon Bay and every voting precinct in the county except Sister Bay Village and Jacksonport.

BRIDGE EARNINGS FOR ONE YEAR

Tolls Amount To \$5,984.46 During First Year Operated By City.

Last Sunday, Nov. 3, terminated the first year's ownership of the bridge by the city, and during that period \$5,984.46 was collected in tolls.

The first month the city owned the bridge, November, 1911, the receipts were \$23.69, and the twelfth month, October, 1912, the receipts were \$43.78, showing a decided increase for corresponding months of each year.

During this year that the city has owned the bridge it was closed from Jan. 6 to March 20, and one week in April and two weeks in May to team traffic.

The labor cost to the city for operating the bridge is \$3.90 per day, and the light and other running expenses is divided between the railroad company and the city.

OFFICERS ARE ELECTED

COMMERCIAL CLUB CHOOSES ITS FIVE DIRECTORS.

The Directors, At a Later Meeting, Elected the Other Officers, and the Organization is Ready For Business.

On Thursday evening of last week business men met at the city hall and completed the organization of the "Commercial Club." A few changes were made to the constitution and by-laws, the most important being in reference to initiation fees and dues. The membership will be divided into two classes: Merchants, business men, professional men and employers will be in one class, and will pay \$5.00 initiation fee. Other citizens will come under class two and the initiation fee will be but \$2.50. It is desired to secure as members every citizen who has the welfare of Sturgeon Bay and Door county at heart.

The following were elected as a board of directors: J. Rosenberg, for one year; H. C. Scofield and R. Weitlich, for two years; Frank I. Pleck and H. J. Sanderson, for three years.

At the meeting on Thursday evening H. R. Isherwood, president of the Community Development Club of Sawyer, gave a talk which was of interest to those present. The Commercial Club and the Community Development Club will work together for the interest of the city as a whole. There are many things for the general welfare of the public in which this can be done, such as bettering the railroad, telephone and transportation service.

Immediately after organization the directors held a conference with the Kelseys in regard to retaining the Kelsey fly-net factory in this city, which is a branch of the main factory at Algoma. Altho the machinery was ready to be shipped to Algoma, shipment was delayed and Mr. Kelsey will be in the city to confer with the Commercial Club in regard to retaining the branch factory here.

The varnish factory proposition is still under consideration and it is expected that representatives of the company will visit this city next week to discuss the matter.

Relics of the Civil War.

The local G. A. R. Post has received a number of specimens of bank notes issued by the confederate states of America, and they will be framed and kept on exhibition at the post headquarters.

These notes came into possession of the Union army about the close of the Civil war, and were turned over by the War Department to the treasury of the United States in the year 1867.

The treasury has no complete series of the notes, and is presenting them to the Grand Army Posts—as historical relics, knowing that the proper disposition will be made for their safe-keeping.

VOTE ON AMENDMENTS

WOMAN SUFFRAGE LOSES OUT IN THE STATE.

Other Three Constitutional Amendments Are Carried—Suffrage Defeated In County.

Three of the four constitutional amendments on which the voters had to decide were passed in the state, the only one defeated being the act to extend the right of suffrage to women. This amendment was defeated by a vote of over 2 to 1 in the state. Wisconsin was the only one of five states that turned down this question. Arizona, Oregon, Kansas and Michigan all voting in favor of it, making a total of ten states now granting the voting privilege to women.

FUNDS COMING FOR HIGHWAYS

Door County's Portion From the State Will Be \$2,447.

The total allotment for Door county from the state highway fund of \$378,000 will be \$2,447. The amount petitioned for by Door county was \$9,735, but owing to the fact that the amount petitioned for by the different counties in the state was \$444,426 in excess of the amount in the state highway fund, it was impossible to give each county the full amount asked for.

Of the fourteen towns in this county, eleven voted for aid and the \$2,447 will be spent on the roads in these towns according to law. The first allotment received from the state will be \$2,257, and the second allotment \$190.

Milwaukee county naturally receives the greatest amount of any county in the state—\$74,456. Three counties in the state receive no aid at all.

INCOME TAX RETURNS

CORPORATION TAXES FOR DOOR COUNTY MADE PUBLIC.

Aggregate Corporation Income Tax For the County Is \$2,453.77, Part of Which Is Offset By Personal Tax.

The corporation income tax returns for Door county, which have been looked forward to with interest, was received by County Clerk Earl M. LaPlant on Saturday.

The report shows that 32 corporations in this county will pay an income tax; however, the personal property tax of the majority of these corporations will offset the amount of the income tax.

The total amount of these 32 corporations totals \$2,453.77, of which \$1,986.70 is assessed against 23 corporations in Sturgeon Bay, \$5,273 against three foreign concerns and \$404.34 against the other six in the county.

These six corporations in the county outside of the city of Sturgeon Bay, to pay a tax are the Pierre, Virlee Co., of Brussels, \$170.76; State Bank of Forestville, \$48.54; Nelson Cheese Factory of Sturgeon Bay town, 36 cents; V. & C. Maschek Co. of Jacksonport, \$6.00; Nasawaupoo Dairy Co., of Nasawaupoo, \$1.68; Sturgeon Bay Stone Co. of Nasawaupoo, \$177.00.

Of the 23 corporations in this city to pay a tax the three highest are Halstead-Mapes Hardware Co., \$300; Bank of Sturgeon Bay \$229.68; Scofield Co. \$206.28. The three lowest are Sturgeon Bay Fruit-Land Co., \$7.08; People's Hospital, \$4.38; L. M. Washburn Co., \$5.57.

The individual tax list has not been received by the county clerk, but the aggregate figures amount to \$1,279.00, which, with the corporation tax, makes a total of \$3,732.88, the greater portion of which will be offset by the personal property tax.

Standing of the Fair Association.

Secretary A. C. Greaves furnished The Democrat the following figures in reference to the Door County Fair Association:

The original indebtedness existing when the enterprise was taken over in 1909 was \$2,870.49. Since that time the cost of improvements made on the grounds, together with interest on the indebtedness, has increased the indebtedness to \$3,708.57. The state aid for 1912 reduces this to \$2,729.57, which is the present indebtedness of the association. The interest on this sum would in a few years pay for the erection of one of the many buildings needed on the grounds, and the directors of the association believe if the county would relieve them of this debt that they would henceforth have no trouble in successfully financing the enterprise and give to the people of Door county a better and bigger annual fair.


