

Eliza[beth] Conklin Flint Clapp of Leicester, Massachusetts

Born: 3 May 1792 to Austin and Elizabeth Flint. Elizabeth Clapp was 58 years old at the time of the 1850 National Woman's Rights Convention held in Worcester, Massachusetts.

Died:

Married: John Clapp of Boston on 5 August 1817.

Children: Julia Clapp (born 12 July 1824); Samuel Lewis Clapp (born 30 July 1826) and Austin Flint Clapp (born 21 September 1828)

In 1850, Mrs. Clapp was living in Leicester with the following people:

Austin Flint - her father, a 90-year-old physician with \$7,000 in personal property

Laura Flint - her sister, a 53-year-old Boarding House keeper

James Thompson - a 46-year-old Wesleyan minister

Cynthia Clapp - 50 years old

Austin F. Clapp - her son, a 22-year-old Card Maker

Laura F. Clapp

Mary Trumbell - 54 years old

Elizabeth Stono - 13 years old

Ellen A. Nourso (Nourso ?) - 19 years old

Mrs. Clapp was a member of the Worcester County Anti Slavery Society South Division.

Mrs. Clapp's sister, Laura Flint mentions the 1850 convention in her diary found at the American Antiquarian Society. She probably did not attend since Dr. Austin Flint died on 29 August 1850 and she was the boarding house keeper with many responsibilities.
